#### **Description**

Lviv. Former Church of St. Martin

The wooden church of St. Martin was built on Pidzamche (north-eastern district of Lviv) in 1630 for the Catholic monastic Order of the Carmelites. It acquired a modern look after its reconstruction in 1736 in stone. The monastery operated until the end of the XVIII century, until Emperor Joseph II, after the accession to Austria of the Galician lands, began to fight against Catholic monastic Orders and carried out their secularization (1781). Until 1945, there was a parish church.

During the Soviet occupation, the temple was closed, its premises were used as a warehouse. Only in the late 90s of the last century the building was transferred to the community of Christians of the Evangelical Faith (Pentecostals).

The architecture of the temple and the bell tower adjacent to the former monastic building has remained virtually unchanged since the construction time. In the volumetric-planning structure and architectural and plastic design, the sacred complex is a vivid example of the Baroque style.

The sculptural decoration of the temple was attended by the outstanding European master Johan Gierg Pinzel. Made by him "Crucifixion", which adorned the altar of the church, now stored in the Museum of Sacred Baroque Sculpture of Johann George Pinzel (former church of the Clarice), which is one of the departments of the Lviv National Art Gallery

named after B. G. Voznitsky - the largest art museum in Ukraine.
